The Archbishop has again directed that in order to minimise the risk of contracting or spreading COVID-19, there should be no congregational singing in Anglican churches in the Diocese of Adelaide until further notice.

The Archbishop has undertaken to maintain a watching brief on advice about singing by SA Health with a view to announcing when it is possible to resume congregational singing.

When familiar chants are used, the congregation may wish to make the offering their own by humming or vocalising quietly, as may be found helpful or devotional.

A reading from the book of the prophet Isaiah.

When you did awesome deeds that we did not expect, you came down, the mountains quaked at your presence. From ages past no one has heard, no ear has perceived, no eye has seen any God besides you, who works for those who wait for him. You meet those who gladly do

right, those who remember you in your ways. But you were angry, and we sinned; because you hid yourself we transgressed. It is like a man going on a journey, when he leaves home and puts his slaves in charge, each with his work and commands the doorkeeper to be on the watch. Therefore, keep awake – for you do not know when the master of the house will come, in the evening, or at midnight, or at cockcrow, or at dawn, or else he may find you asleep when he comes suddenly. And what I say to you I say to all: Keep awake.'

REFLECTION FOR ADVENT SUNDAY

In South Australia for much of our society the Christmas season begins from the day of the Christmas Pageant, then ends on Christmas Day. In the Church we begin the Christmas season on Christmas Day then conclude it on the Feast of the Epiphany – either on January 6th or later on January 13th.

Prior to Christmas the Church gives us the season of Advent lasting four weeks. It is a beautiful season easily lost in the commercial and social rush of December. No matter how much we try to make something of Advent in church we fight a severely difficult battle against the mighty forces of shopping, social engagements, work festivities and the general anticipation of the coming holidays. We cannot underestimate the energy needed to organise family gatherings at Christmas time, either.

The term "Advent is from a Latin word which means "coming". In Advent we think of the two comings of Jesus among us – the first time as a baby in Bethlehem, the second time in glory at the end of time. Accordingly, Advent presents to us themes of encouragement and themes of the need to be prepared, on watch, and to staying awake, ready for the second coming whenever that may be.

To start with in Advent we look ahead to the second coming. Then from the middle of Advent we concentrate on the birth of Jesus as a baby in human history. It is this second theme which captures our imaginations and to some extent society's imaginations, too. With both themes the focus is on Jesus, the very heart of our faith. Advent captures something of the person, the mystery, and the message of Jesus. Advent invites us to reconsider the meaning of being a Christian, a disciple of Jesus.

Though in Advent we look back and look forward in these themes the fact remains that we have to remember that we can only live now! This means that another theme of Advent is that Christ is present in our lives now. The other two themes of Jesus' birth in Bethlehem and Jesus' second coming need to touch our lives now. Advent can be a great time to make a fresh start in life, a time to try to pray more, hope more, give more and love more.

This may make a good deal of sense after a difficult year of Covid 19. But it is certainly difficult to concentrate on Advent while we are pushed and pulled in other directions by the calls of society and family. Try to make some time each day to devote to Advent your way. The season has so much to offer. A well observed Advent makes for a truly wonderful Christmas!
